Thank you again for serving.



Featured Shelter West Valley Women's Crisis Shelter

In September 2018, Matthew 25 expanded outreach services to a West Valley women's crisis shelter. The shelter is a 72-bed, 24-hour emergency shelter for women and children in crisis. At any one time, there are 28 children at the shelter with half of children under the age of three. The women and children can remain at the shelter for up to 120 days. There are 20 beds reserved for transitional housing of up to 12 months. Women have access to counseling, childcare and other comprehensive services.

Our Matthew 25 team is led by Steve and Lisa Sluyk with support by Dave and Willie Pearson and Sylvia Adelman. Steve is a semi-retired endodontist who also volunteers doing dentistry at the Neighborhood Christian Clinic and teaches dentistry to residents at St. Vincent de Paul. Lisa volunteers at the Phoenix Children's Hospital. Both have been volunteering for years at church, school, sports teams and in the community. Serving at Matthew 25 has given Steve and Lisa the perfect opportunity to make a difference together.

Steve and Lisa have three married children and six grandchildren. Lisa likes to play tennis, read and entertain guests and family. Steve is an avid runner participating in international marathons, enjoys biking, hiking and recently has taken up golfing.

Monthly Outreach

Halle Women's Center

Opened in June 2017, the Halle Center replaced the emergency housing on Watkins and 11th Ave. Some women from Watkins transitioned to Halle Center where they receive assistance in gaining skills, finding jobs and permanent housing. The shelter houses about 130 women at any one time.

Matthew 25 transitioned to the new location and began serving there in August 2017. Each month, we serve 75 to 80 women with meals, Bibles, reading glasses, toiletries, socks, underwear and seasonal necessities. We have prayer warriors who will pray with the ladies or take their prayer requests. Each month we need approximately 32 volunteers to serve at Halle Center. The most important attributes of our volunteers are warm smiles and flexibility. Volunteers are involved as greeters, food preps, servers, cleanup crew or helping at the toiletry table. The ladies at Halle Center are most appreciative of Matthew 25 volunteers.

UMOM New Day Centers

A shelter providing emergency and extended housing to families, youth, and single women experiencing homelessness. Residents have resources to training, onsite childcare, and a computer lab to help them find a job.

Each month, Matthew 25 needs about 15 volunteers to serve approximately 140 women and families at this shelter. We gift Bibles and reading glasses to the residents. The children enjoy the games and crafts we provide each month.

East Valley Men's Center

EVMC is a men's only transitional shelter. The men are helped in their efforts to find work and are given clothing and transportation (bicycles) to commute to their place of employment. A portion of their wages are retained by EVMC in order to help them set money aside for a deposit for an apartment.

Matthew 25 began serving at this housing in 2016 led by Ryan Babcock with about 10 volunteers. Bibles and reading glasses are given to the men each month.

MANA House

Catholic Charities MANA (Marines, Army, Navy, Airforce) House is a temporary, transitional shelter for veterans. Their mission is to offer personal, individualized basic resources, community and advocacy for all veterans.

Matthew 25 began serving at MANA around 2008, being one of the first ministries to serve there. Each month we serve approximately 35 men. Ages have varied from the 20's to 80 years old. Jim Kelly leads a team of volunteers including Glenn and Debbie who have been dedicated and regularly serves at MANA.

Bridge to Hope

A transformational housing ministry that offers housing to homeless single mothers and their children. B2H provides emergency services, crisis intervention, counseling, food, clothing and training in skills necessary for full-time employment and financial independence.

Matthew 25 started serving at B2H in 2000 led by Dennis and Eliza Schmidt, and recently by Keith Wollaver. We serve meals on the first Thursday of each month.
